



You can help...

When someone collapses and stops breathing it means they have gone into cardiac arrest. At this point the person's heart has stopped beating and they have minutes to receive the emergency treatment that could save their life.

An ambulance will usually reach this patient within eight minutes, but if someone with the basic skills and equipment who lives near the patient could begin treatment while an ambulance was on the way, they would have a much better chance of survival.

Other symptoms, such as chest pain and difficulty in breathing, which can in some cases result in cardiac arrest, can also be alleviated whilst an ambulance is on the way.

We are looking for volunteers who live or work in the UB1, UB2, UB5 and UB6 postcode districts, have one year's driving experience and access to a roadworthy car. You would be serving your community by responding alongside our ambulance crews to people in a life-threatening condition.

As an Ambulance Community Responder you will be trained in emergency life support to a nationally-recognised level, including being taught how to use a defibrillator – a machine used to restart a person's heart when it stops beating. The early use of a defibrillator is essential to saving someone's life.
